MEET THE SOUTHERN



The Southern Resident Killer Whales (SKRW) are a genetically and culturally distinct group of orcas that rule the Salish Sea as an apex predator



SKRW's live cooperatively within multigenerational family groups called **pods**.

Unlike most other species on earth, these communities are led by a **matriarch**, the oldest female in the group.

There are currently 3 pods: J pod, L pod, and K pod Just like humans, each SRKW has their own unique personality, and are known for their empathy and charisma



TODAY ONLY 72 SRKW REMAIN...WHY?

1. LACK OF PREY

The SRKW diet consists of **80%** Chinook Salmon, which are also **critically endangered**

Four dams constructed on the lower Snake River in eastern Washington have led to a **90%** reduction in wild Chinook Salmon populations

2. WATER TOXICITY

Persisting PCBs in the ocean, in addition to industrial and commercial pollutants that make their way to the sea accumulate in SRKW bodies, **weakening** their immune systems and **stunt** their ability to reproduce

3. NOISE POLLUTION

Noise pollution caused by high levels of vessel traffic and unsafe boating practices impact SRKW's ability to **locate food** sources, **navigate** the ocean, and **communicate** with each

Saving the Southern Resident Killer Whales is crucial due to their ecological, cultural, and economic significance

TODAY THE DAMS ARE ESSENTIALLY USELESS

Wind and Solar energy solutions in the Pacific Northwest have replaced the energy produced by the lower four dams **6x over**

The Cost Savings of Dam Removal:

• Over 10 years : **\$1.6 billion**

• Over 20 years : **\$4.61 billion**

BENEFITS OF DAM REMOVAL

- **2.5x** increase in salmon production in the Snake River
- 5-fold increase between \$4 billion and \$7 billion over 10 years in new annual revenue from tourism, recovered fish runs, and outdoor recreation
- Southern Resident Killer Whales primary food source restored

- 4. 91% of plastic is NOT recycled. Practice the 3 R'sreduce, reuse, and recycle. Decreasing your plastic consumption saves lives
- Be aware of the harmful chemicals in household products. Choose Eco-friendly household cleaning products
- Be mindful of the media you consume. Not everything on the internet is true. Having accurate scientific info is CRUCIAL
